David honoured by King Charles

Morpeth soldier David Sanderson has been honoured by King Charles III for the role he played in being one of eight pallbearers who carried the Monarch's late mother's coffin during her funeral service last September.

David, along with his seven colleagues from the Queen's Company, 1st Battalion of the Grenadier Guards, has been awarded the Royal Victorian Medal which is given at the personal discretion of the Monarch. The honour was first established in 1896 by Queen Victoria for recipients who had loyally served her during her long reign.

The King has honoured a succession of Royal aides, military personnel and civil servants for the exceptional service they gave during the funeral of her late Majesty.

As millions watched on either in London or on television sets around the world, David and his colleagues carried the Queen's lead-lined coffin out of Westminster Hall where it had lain

in state and on into Westminster Abbey for the funeral service.

Later they would also carry the coffin up the steep-steps of St George's Chapel in Windsor Abbey to the Queen's final resting place alongside her late husband the Duke of Edinburgh.

Throughout, 19-year-old David was at the forefront of attention being one the two guardsmen leading the other six pallbearers, and the faultless and exemplary way they all performed their duty that day was universally praised both at home and abroad.

The Army would later say that 'only the best of the best' had been chosen to make up the pallbearer's party.

David had joined the Army after leaving King Edward's VI School in Morpeth at the age of 16, first training at the Army Foundation College in Harrogate before joining his first regiment, the 2nd Battalion Grenadier Guards Nimegen Company. Later, he transferred to the Queen's Company 1st Battalion.

When we first reported the story of David Sanderson proudly doing his duty for Queen and Country, his Mum Carolyn told us how proud she and his father Peter, younger brother Daniel and all his family and friends were that he had been singled out for a duty that he would remember for the rest of his life. "As a family we could not be more proud of David," she said.

Pupils fighting back against plastic pollution

The pollution of the world's oceans, rivers, countryside, and urban environments is an issue that is of rapidly growing global concern. Verified figures show that 12 million tonnes of plastic are finding their way into the oceans and rivers of the world each year, destroying habits and killing wildlife, while closer to home millions of discarded plastic bottles add to littering around Britain every single day.

But what can be done about this rapidly growing problem? Environmentalists from Surfers Against Sewage (SAS) which believes the world is drowning in a toxic tide of plastic waste, are a group tackling the problem head-on and one way they are doing that is by running a Plastic Free Schools' campaign.

Which is exactly what the pupils and staff from one Morpeth school are determined to become!

St Robert's Catholic First School in Oldgate has been working towards this goal for a while now and indeed, is close to achieving the SAS accreditation.

The aim of Plastic Free Schools is to encourage the next generation to look at ways of ridding their communities of plastic waste and to find better alternatives to single-use plastic commodities and containers.

Teacher Alice Butler said that already the school has switched to paper straws rather than plastic, while children are taking in re-usable drinks' containers rather than plastic bottles.

Once a month, older pupils from the school also set out on a supervised litter-picking exercise in Carlisle Park collecting plastic bottles, take-away containers, sachets and food packaging among other waste. They are also looking at other ways to reduce plastic waste in the school by cutting back on plastic bin bags and the lamination of documents and reports.

The SAS campaign also encourages

children from its participating schools to make their voices heard from their playgrounds to Parliament, by lobbying their MPs which the St Robert's children did when they invited Wansbeck's Ian Lavery to join them for the morning to see for himself the work they are putting in to become a Plastic Free School.

"It was heart-warming and so encouraging to see the enthusiasm and commitment shown by the St Robert's youngsters to get involved at a very local level in the fight against plastic waste and pollution," he said. "They will certainly have my full support both locally and in the House of Commons for what they are doing because they are setting a marvellous example for their older generations to follow."

Trust us to do our best for Morpeth... GMDT!

For close on two decades an inspirational and aspirational community-led organisation has been at the very forefront of ensuring Morpeth proudly retains the status it has enjoyed for literally hundreds of years, as one of the premier market towns in the North of England, and that going forward it will continue to be a unique and desirable place to live, work and visit.

The Greater Morpeth **Development Trust has** been behind so many of the wonderful things that have happened in the town since it came into being in 2006. At that time, it was set up to help deliver what was known as the Castles, Woods and Water project the former Castle Morpeth District Council had secured government funding for, with the aim of safeguarding and improving historic buildings, ancient woodlands and picturesque riverside walks along a fivemile corridor of the River Wansbeck running through Morpeth from the villages of Mitford to Bothal.

What the Trust has achieved in the intervening 17 years from its inception to the present day, has, however, far exceeded those original aspirations and objectives and, in fact, has been little short of remarkable!

There have been some spectacular successes projectled by the Trust including the transformation of two of Morpeth's iconic buildings which were both given new leases life that made them fit for the 21st Century whilst retaining their original charm and splendour – namely the 300-year-old Town Hall designed by Sir John Vanburgh of Blenheim Palace

and Castle Howard fame, and the wonderful Victorian railway station first opened in 1846 at the start of the pioneering days of rail travel.

GMDT also played a leading role in helping attract the necessary funding to restore the 14th Century Pele Tower at Cresswell so that it could be opened as a community asset and visitor attraction, at the same time as securing its withdrawal from Historic England's register of ancient properties considered to be most at risk of being beyond salvation.

Ten years ago, the Trust was a central player in organising events to mark the centenary of the death of local suffragette campaigner Emily Wilding Davison, after earlier securing the funding to restore her grave in Morpeth's St Mary's Churchyard from its neglected state, as a fitting tribute to someone who fought – and died – to give the women of Britain the right to vote.

If those are the Trust's standout achievements, there have been so many others that have impacted on the life of local people. Sticking to its original brief, the Trust has inspired the restoration of riverside and woodland footpaths notably through the picturesque Bluebell Woods, and also commissioning informative signage to assist walkers to enjoy the wildlife, flora and fauna they encounter on their walks, as well as supporting volunteer clean-ups and litter-picks around town.

GMDT has managed local Heritage Open Days as part of a nationwide initiative to allow people to enjoy history on their doorsteps; brought the cinema back to Morpeth through monthly screenings of top movies in the town; published the works of local authors such as Bridget Gubbins who has written a series of books about life in Morpeth over the past 1,000 years; and co-organised the town's first book festival.

Once a year at the start of summer the Trust also organises Picnic in the Park, an afternoon of fun and games in Carlisle Park, freely enjoyed by many, many Morpeth families.

Much of what the Trust has achieved or been involved with in partnerships with other organisations, the public and private sector, voluntary groups and volunteers, would simply not have been possible without the expertise it built up over many years to secure financial support from a range of funders such as the National Lottery, the Railway Heritage Trust,

local authorities and other partners.

Since its inception GMDT has brought into Morpeth more than £12 million in funding that has added so much value to projects it has invested in, to make Morpeth a better place to live, work and visit. Its projects have been delivered through a hardworking and dedicated board of volunteer directors, a small staff team and supportive volunteers, and when I was asked to write a foreword to a book chronicling what the Trust has achieved I said it had constantly punched above its weight on behalf of Morpeth and the people of the town and that's its work had often slipped under the radar and not attracted the credit it has deserved.

Recently, the Trust has been going through a period of change and re-organisation with new board members and chairman, who remain totally committed to ensuring that GMDT will continue its sterling work going forward into the future and do its best for the town.

Very shortly, Dai Richards, best known as the Keep Britain Tidy Ambassador for Morpeth, will take over as chairman from Mike Willis, who had done the job for two years. The Trust will continue

to work through a series of sector headings such as Arts & Culture, Community, Recreation & Leisure, Wellbeing and Upkeep that subdivide into smaller, individual projects some of which are existing and some of which will be new.

"We are going through a time of change but what will not change is the commitment and determination of everyone involved with the Trust, to improve the town and surrounding countryside for public benefit, the economic and social wellbeing of people living in and around Morpeth," Dai told me.

"We will continue to work with partners of all shapes and sizes, for the good of Morpeth and we would love to open up that approach to many more local people in particular."

In that regard Dai issued an invitation for more people to join the Trust as volunteers making use of whatever skills and expertise they can individually bring to a whole range of projects it is involved with.

"It may be, for example, that someone who has DIY skills and a little time to spare, could help maintain the signage we have placed in

woods and walks, or they could assist us to staff and man events such as Picnic in the Park, our Community Cinema, the Morpeth Gathering or even become involved in tree planting, litter picking or maintaining landscaping areas around the station.

"There are so many rewarding ways that people could volunteer to join in with the work of the Trust, and, at the same time, we would be delighted to hear any new ideas about what we could become involved with in the future, for the benefit of Morpeth."

One potentially major project GMDT is currently involved in, is talking about creating and developing an arts and cultural centre in Morpeth, with a theatre capacity for musical and concert events.

"There are so many chances for local people to help us ensure our town continues to develop and be a wonderful place to live, work and visit," added Dai. "Greater Morpeth Development Trust has done so much to make that happen over many years, and we are determined we will continue to do that over the years ahead."

Fantastic Fair Day funding news

Substantial funding has been secured to guarantee that the popular Morpeth Fair can be held for the next two years starting this June, reports Inside Morpeth Editor lan Leech.

The support of the North of Tyne Combined Authority through its £1m Events Scale Up fund, means that not only has the future of the fair being secured, but that it will be bigger and better than ever. Morpeth is just one of two events being supported in Northumberland through the fund, the other being the Berwick Film & Media Arts Festival. The remaining three events are in Whitley Bay, Tynemouth and Newcastle.

Started more than 30 years ago by the Morpeth Chamber of Trade to help raise funds for the town's dazzling Christmas Lights' display, the fair will for the first time be extended to a two-day event in the centre of town.

Northumberland County Councillor John Beynon who has played a key role in every single fair day, said that the event is being supported with matched funding to the tune of up to £94,000 over the next two years by the North of Tyne Combined Authority. "It is fantastic news and a real coup for Morpeth," he told me.

Fair Day has annually drawn an estimated 30,000 visitors into the town on one single Sunday in June, every year since it first began. "People love Fair Day – not just local residents but the many, many thousands who have been attracted to Morpeth to enjoy the event and the good thing is that we know many of our outside visitors have kept coming back because they have had such a great day out in the town," said Councillor Beynon.

Three years ago, the future of Morpeth Fair was looking bleak after it twice had to be cancelled in successive years because of the Covid pandemic lock-down. It was re-started last year by Councillor Beynon and a number of colleagues, after the Chamber of Trade said it could no longer be involved in the event.

"I was determined that Fair Day should not fold because it has been such a popular event for so long," said Councillor Beynon. "In its heyday the event was raising around £12,000 a year which we were able to re-invest in promoting tourism in Morpeth and the town's Christmas Lights which are always some

of the best in the region.

"However, finding sufficient funding to support the fair has always been a worry – until now."

After being alerted to the potential North of Tyne Combined Authority funds
Councillor Beynon and his colleagues –
Brett Turner, Pat Elton and Mark Wilson – set about compiling their application which he admits was 'a huge task' but well worth it to secure the funding which will guarantee the event takes place this year and next.

On Saturday June 10th the organisers are planning a mini-food and drinks' festival in Morpeth Market Place, while as many as six top local and regional brass bands will be taking part in the festival of music outside the Pavilion Café in Carlisle Park.

As always, the Sunday of the weekend will see the main fair activities taking place when the stage at the Pavilion will host music by Morpeth Pipe Band and three popular local groups – Andy Rayner, Work in Progress and Understudies.

There'll be stalls along Bridge Street and around the Market Place; food from all around the world at the Oldgate Food Court, while on the Stanners there will be kiddies rides, pony rides, a dog show, folk music, the Army climbing wall and a recruitment display and a line-up of veteran and vintage cars and motor cycles.

The usual parade of old cars and bikes will pass through the town centre and anyone owning an old vehicle wanting to take part can contact norman.rickard@hotmail.co.uk

As always there will be show rides, swings and roundabouts in the New Market car park on both days.

The organisers are delighted to announce that a new logo for Morpeth Fair is being designed by pupils from the town's Collingwood School who will also be filming and photographing events over the two days.

"We are over the moon that the future of Morpeth Fair has been guaranteed for the next two years," said John Beynon. "It has been a fixture in Morpeth's social calendar for more than three decades and an event some of us were determined should continue to be enjoyed going forward by the people of Morpeth and the thousands of people it brings into the town, for many years to come.

"Now that we know we have the funding, we will be going flat out to make the 2024 event even bigger and better than it has ever been!"

So what exactly could your family be liable for? We've already discussed the residence nil-rate band threshold of £175,000. Then you can factor in that the first £325,000 of your estate is likely to be exempt from IHT. This means that, subject to various conditions, if you're married or in a civil partnership, you could have a tax-free estate worth £1,000,000.

Yet the simple fact is that IHT could be considered a voluntary tax. The Treasury relies on our inertia and reluctance to confront the issues of death and inheritance. To make things worse, the Treasury's coffers are boosted at the exact time your loved ones least need the added hassle.

Help your family now

There are many perfectly legitimate ways to mitigate IHT through foresight and careful financial planning. You don't need high-powered tax planning, just a willingness to discuss the issue, act and make use of the many options available. These include establishing trusts (they won't be regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority) and making use of annual exemptions such as gifting.

Fund-raising promise fullfilled during a very busy mayoral year

Spring has finally sprung with handing out the traditional Easter Oranges in Carlisle Park on Easter Monday, followed by Boolin' and Japin' and other children's games.

There was also a free 'Spring into Easter' activities programme for nine to 14-year-olds from Easter Monday, 10th April to 12th April, run by young people's charity Barnabas Safe & Sound and LASP Outdoor Adventures which we hope will continue during the next half term and Summer holidays.

I have the honour of opening the 2023 Morpeth Northumbrian Gathering over the weekend of 14th - 16th April and Deputy Mayor Jade and I will be in attendance in the historic Mayor's Parlour and Council Chamber in the Town Hall on Sunday 16th April at 1pm – your chance to see the Town Treasures, including the town hutch, bull rope and scolds' bridle!

Finally, just before the Mayor making ceremony, we will be celebrating the Coronation of our new King Charles III, with a Garden Party on the Stanners on Sunday 7th May from 11am to 5pm, in conjunction with the organisers of

Morpeth Fair Day, including music, food, entertainment and the Coronation Cup under 8's and under 9's football tournament organised by Morpeth Town Juniors. #NlandCoro

To round off a historic weekend, I will then be attending Traditional Sung Evensong, celebrating the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III with the choir, at St Mary's Church at 6pm.

This will be my last Mayor's Address in my third term as Mayor of Morpeth. The last year has been a busy but wonderful time and it is always a pleasure and a privilege to be Mayor of such an attractive and successful town, with its great history, heritage and most of all, active community life.

This year, as social life returned to normal again following the Covid-19 pandemic, I promised to raise at least £1000 each for half a dozen small, local charities: Ellington Colliery Band (now based in Morpeth), Stobhill Link, The 4th Morpeth Scout hut extension, Wansbeck Valley Food Bank, Friends of Morpeth's Floral Clock and Northumberland Mountain Rescue.

Among many other enjoyable visits and events, we have had an Italian Night at Lollo Rosso, Curry night at Tandoor Mahal, the Deputy Mayor's Burns

Mayor-making evening




Please check the Town Council website and Facebook page for updates and confirmed opening times to avoid any disappointment.

Brilliant new leisure centre for Morpeth... Glen Sanderson

Morpeth's super new sports and leisure centre has opened with a ringing endorsement of the way it will transform the provision of indoor recreation in the town, reports **Inside Morpeth Editor Ian Leech**.

Built at a cost of £21 million by Northumberland County Council, the new centre in Gas House Lane, will be operated and managed by Active Northumberland.

As Councillor Glen Sanderson (Leader of Northumberland County Council) told me after cutting a ribbon to formally open the new centre: "This is certainly a 'Red Letter' day for Morpeth and indeed, the whole surrounding area.

"We have provided a brilliant new centre at a time when a lot of councils across the country are actually closing leisure centres and swimming pools or not investing in new facilities such as this, while we as a county council have put leisure at the top of the list for expenditure.

"In Northumberland we have invested very heavily in leisure and recreation in recent years - in brand-new centres in Berwick, Ponteland and now Morpeth,

at the same time as upgrading existing facilities in Hexham, Newbiggin, Blyth and Cramlington and we have done that because we think leisure is so very important for people's health, their well-being and enjoyment.

"Leisure makes people feel happier and better about themselves in terms of mental health and other health issues, and because exercise is invaluable to them.

"We are hugely proud of this Morpeth centre, just as we are of our new or upgraded other centres around the county," added Councillor Sanderson. "We made a conscious decision to create a capital programme over the next five years bound into the key fundamental priorities of education and the development of new schools, sport and leisure and the provision of excellent customers services. We are very clear about where our priorities lie - one is to provide value for money for council

taxpayers; the second is to encourage and safeguard the provision of jobs and employment; And thirdly to do all we can to tackle inequality."

The creation of the new Morpeth centre, Councillor Sanderson said, embodies all three priorities. "Here we are providing value for money, creating new jobs and tackling inequality because people with lower incomes can come and enjoy using our facilities through our concessions," he said.

David Bawn, a former Mayor of the town, described the opening of the centre to me as a 'real game-changer for Morpeth.'

"Top-notch facilities have been provided across the board at the centre that will bring real benefits to the town," he said. 'What also pleases me is that while this is a very modern building, it also gives a nod to the historical architecture of the town centre of Morpeth. It will become one of the future iconic buildings of the town."





Travelling across Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovia and East Germany as it was then, with virtually no money, was, she says, not only a problem but an opportunity that also gave her a rare and deep insight into the lives and experiences of people living behind the Iron Curtain.


Northumberland County Cup Final against Alnwick RFC Colts, winning convincingly 46 - 10 to seal the Double. Played at Northern Ruby Club.





Changing of the seasons a garden time to savour

Our gardening expert Ross Pearson looks ahead to the new year in the garden

There is a temporary preciousness to late spring where gardens appear to change on a daily basis; blink and you miss it.

From trees with their boughs at breaking point, laden with cherry blossom to the way the changing light plays with colour revealing subtleties in tone and depth, April and May are exciting months to savour. The days are getting longer and just in the nick of time too as the gardeners 'to do' list grows as fast as the tender green shoots from herbaceous perennials in the borders. Get on top of the jobs now, however and gardeners' time can be better spent enjoying the garden in summer with a tipple in hand rather than a trowel!

Reduce watering

One of my favourite summer jobs is the half an hour spent watering at the end of the day and taking stock of the garden; a luxury that is not always possible daily. Mulching your borders now will ensure water retention and nourish the soil for healthier plants. Water the soil well

before spreading a thick layer of garden compost or well rotted manure up to but not over the plants. Bulk buying compost is always cheaper but even if you can't mulch the whole garden, work on one area this year and move along to the next.

Sweet pea heaven

Nothing smells better than a vase of freshly cut sweet peas from the garden. Plant them out now in containers supported by canes and tie in initially until their tendrils latch on. Sweet peas are hungry and thirsty plants so for the best flowering crop, use good quality compost and well rotted manure at the bottom of the pot. Nip out the tips of any leggy plants for bushier growth.

Direct sowing

If you are limited on indoor sowing space, wait until the soil warms up and direct sow the seeds of vegetables including peas, beans, carrot, parsnip, beetroot, sweetcorn, spinach and chard. Sow in shallow drills, watering the drill before planting so as not to disturb the seed. The key to healthy veg is to thin out the seedlings as they grow. Leave courgettes

until late May as they germinate quickly and require warmer temperatures.

Hardening off

It is important to harden off any indoorsown plants before planting outdoors to acclimatise them to the change in temperature. A cold frame is ideal but if you don't have the space, move the tender plants to a sunny but sheltered spot in the morning and bring indoors at night for around two weeks. In the second week, they can be left outdoors overnight but cover with fleece to keep them protected.

Chelsea chop

Traditionally carried out around the week of the RHS Chelsea Flower Show, hence the name, the 'Chelsea chop' is a technique to encourage stockier herbaceous perennials and a longer flowering period. Cut back tall plants such as helenium, echinacea and aster to around half their height to stop them flopping over in summer. To prolong flowering, only cut back half of the plant to encourage later successional blooms.
