

Golf champion just 11 years old!

Amelia Temperley from Morpeth, has won her home-town golf club's ladies' championship at the age of just 11 to become the youngest ever winner of the event in its 86-year-old history, writes **Inside Morpeth Editor Ian Leech**.

In only her second season playing the game, the Newminster School pupil beat the current Lady Club Captain Colleen Brown on the 20th hole of the semi-final before going on to win 3 & 2 against former champion Julie Ribeiro.

Amelia only took up the game after asking her Dad Chris if she could go with him one evening to the driving range at Longhirst Golf Club, and is now so hooked on golf that she practises at the range every evening after school as well as playing the Morpeth course at weekends.

So good has she become at the game that her handicap has fallen from 18.8 at the beginning of this year to 7.1 and she will be aiming to cut it by a further three strokes next year.

As well as becoming the youngest male or female Morpeth club champion by at least five years, Amelia now regularly plays for the ladies' first team and Northumberland




County Juniors, and in addition to this amazing local success, she has also played numerous times on the Northern Junior Golf Tour, winning four times with one being the National Girls' Championship allowing her to qualify on the Justin Rose Telegraph leader board and then compete in the Champion of Champions tournament next July at Lough Erne in Ireland.

This year she was also Northumberland's choice as the most improved young player in the county.

Perhaps not surprisingly, Amelia is setting her sights on a career as a professional golfer when she is old enough as she told me. When I asked her what she enjoys most about the game she emphatically replied without a moment's hesitation – 'Winning!'

Colleen also told me: "As a club we are delighted by Amelia's success and she is such a talented player for her age."

Mum Kylie added: "As a family we are super-proud of Amelia and all she is achieving in the game."

A visit at Twixmas will eek out the last of the festivities with the house open and dressed in its festive finery until the 7 January, and you can enjoy more live music as you see in the New Year.



Food banks aren't just for Christmas!

No one should go hungry at Christmas or indeed at any time of the year, is a guiding principle of more than 2,500 food banks that are providing emergency supplies to hungry people across the length and breadth of Britain – and the Wansbeck Valley Food Bank based in Morpeth, is no exception to that rule!

Set up as a registered charity in 2012, more than 70 volunteers willingly give up their time ro each week provide a life-line service for people of all ages in South East Northumberland, who have nowhere else to turn when faced with the grim reality of food poverty.

Each month they collect food and donations before packing and distributing, and on average feeding about 3,000 people a month, although these figures can substantially increase at peak times of the year including school holidays, and, of course, at Christmas.

The food bank – the largest independent one in Northumberland - covers an area from Hadston, Red Row and Broomhill, on to Widdrington, Ellington and Lynemouth then down through Morpeth, Stannington, Bedlington, Ashington and Newbiggin, and it can only continue to do the great work it does thanks to the never-ending generosity of local people and their communities, businesses and supermarkets. Right now it needs all the help it can get at a time of the year when

families – and single people – are under great financial strains.

Not just because of Christmas and the pressure the festive season puts on people's purse strings, but because winter is knocking on the door and many people will once again face the awful dilemma after paying their household bills, of eating or heating their homes.

People use food banks for a variety of reasons such as losing their job; being faced with unexpected bills; family break-ups; or just being caught up in the spiralling cost-of-living crisis. They have to be referred to the service by their GP, or one of a number of organisations such as Social Services, Children's Service or a Citizens Advice Bureau, and anyone qualifying for help including those with special dietary needs, will receive enough food to last them for at least three days.

As we said, these are challenging times for food banks and Wansbeck Valley like all the others nationwide, values and appreciates any help people can give them. So, how can you help?

By donating non-perishable food at a number of collection points around the area including the Sainsbury, Morrisons and Lidl supermarkets in Morpeth as well as Co-ops at Loansdean, Pegswood or Lynemouth; the Newcastle Building Society in the Market Place; or the Co-op Funeral Directors, and the Martino Lounge in Sanderson Arcade.

What sort of food or drink items are needed? Tea bags, coffee and longlife milk; crisps or snacks; shop-bought jam;

tinned custard or rice; tins of vegetables, meat, hotdogs, potatoes or spaghetti, fruit, baked beans, soup; chocolate or boxes of biscuits are just a few examples of the goods the food banks are always grateful for.

Monetary donations are always welcome too because food banks have to supplement the food and drink donations they are given by buying in additional supplies, while some people choose to leave bequests in their wills as a way offering financial help.

Or you could become a volunteer with the Wansbeck Valley Food Bank, working in its Morpeth warehouse packing bags, sorting donations and maintaining stocks on shelves; being a driver of one its two vans collecting donations, delivering parcels to a collection point at Ashington YMCA, or by being a driver's 'buddy.' Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer can contact the Wansbeck Valley Food Bank Co-ordinators Claire Slater or Helen Griffiths on (01670) 943014.

Chairman of the Food Bank trustees Richard Anderson, says the past year has been full of challenges coming on top of the Covid Pandemic and the cost-of-living crisis, resulting in the highest-ever need for its services. But as the trustees and volunteers who keep the service running say, their doors remain open to those who have nowhere else to turn to and that will be the same tomorrow, the day after and the day after that!

Flood resilience following recent storms

The recent storms with continued and persistent heavy rains tested flood defences along the riverbanks through Morpeth. In this exclusive article for Inside Morpeth, the **Environment Agency** explains how the systems coped with the severe weather conditions and has some sage advice for local home-owners and business as to ways they can increase resilience in the event of future storms.

Along with much of the country, Northumberland had a testing time with Storms Babet and Ciaran, interspersed with other periods of heavy rainfall.

In Morpeth the Environment Agency's flood defences were brought into action. The system itself consists of two parts: the in-town defences and the Mitford Dam Flood Storage Reservoir situated about 4km upstream.

The dam is programmed to control the flow of water through Morpeth up to a predetermined maximum volume.

In a flood event, once that level is reached, a series of penstock gates begin to close and impound water to ensure that level is

not exceeded. This means that the water level in the town will be close to the top of the walls for a large proportion of an event as the dam controls the flow.

Whilst we understand that seeing the Wansbeck at a high level in town can cause a level of anxiety within the community, operating the defences in this way allows us to provide the best level of protection for Morpeth by utilising the flood walls in town and ensuring the dam can use its full capacity if necessary.

Closing the penstock gates earlier would reduce the available storage capacity at the Dam and reduce the level of protection available.

The event on 20th October was a significant event and the largest we have seen on the Wansbeck since the scheme was built in 2015.

We are currently reviewing the data to see if there any further tweaks we need to make to our operational systems but the scheme operated as expected and prevented over 1,000 properties from being flooded.

Following these recent events, the Environment Agency and Northumberland County Council are urging people to think about how they can reduce their risk of flooding.

Being flooded is absolutely devastating and any steps that can be taken towards better protecting your property, business and community can significantly lessen the impact.

Ways that you can increase your resilience to flooding are:



Check your flood risk from rivers, sea and surface water on the flood warning information service flood maps by visiting - **www.gov.uk/check-flood-risk** or scan the QR code.



Sign up to the Flood Warning Service to receive free flood warning messages by visiting - **www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings** or scan the QR code.



Create a Personal Flood Plan and pack a grab bag with essentials – visit **www.gov.uk/government/publications/personal-flood-plan** or scan the QR code for advice. Personal Flood Plans are also available to pick up in the Morpeth Library.



Look to install flood protection products – visit **bluepages.org.uk/protecting-my-property** or scan the QR code for further advice.



Make sure you have the right level of insurance cover needed – visit **www.floodre.co.uk** or scan the QR code.



Regularly check for weather updates, by visiting -www.metoffice.gov.uk or scan the QR code.

Secret Laura could never tell until now

A remarkable book written and self-published by Morpeth Mum-of-three Laura Coel that deals with the painful subject of child abuse, is now on sale in the town, writes Ian Leech.

Laura – perhaps best known locally as talented singer and entertainer Lou Coel (pictured) – has written the book from her own experiences of being abused when she was a young girl aged from just nine years old.

Waiving her right to anonymity at the age of 19, she eventually found the courage to speak up about what had happened to her, five years after the abuse stopped, Her abuser was subsequently sent to prison.

Now, she has written 'Laura's Secret' to share as a resource for children as well as parents, safeguarding agencies and schools, to help young people being abused to understand that is alright to talk to someone about what is happening to them and to seek help from a person they can trust.

Laura told me that when she was being abused she felt too ashamed



and embarrassed to reveal what was happening to her. "If I had been able to talk to someone and seek help, it could have made all the difference, but I just wasn't unable to do so," she said.

"If I'd had a book like mine to read as a child, I might have been able to talk to someone or give some clues as to what was going on and the 'secret' my abuser asked me to keep."

The storyline of 'Laura's Secret' is told gently and in such a readable way for young readers to easily understand, and it is also sympathetically and beautifully graphically portrayed by illustrator Lena Lion from Ukraine. Laura contacted Lena after finding her profile on line, and remarkably despite being separated by some 2,000 miles and never meeting other than by Zoom calls, they have produced a narrative so in tune with one another.

What is also special about the book is that in the introduction Laura has written up notes so that parents and carers, can navigate their way through the reading experience with their children. At the end of the story there are also questions parents can work their way through with their children, as well as advice as to how to cope with the revelation from a child that they are being abused.

Laura hopes that her book can help start important conversations with children to help them know what is allowed and what is inappropriate. "Talking to children about how to protect themselves from any form of abuse can be over-whelming, but it does not need to be," said Laura.

"If the book can prevent one child from enduring the suffering and torment I went through, then I will have done my job."

Welcome to Oldgate 'village'

Oldgate which runs from the edge of the Market Place to the banks of the River Wansbeck, is one of the most historic corners of Morpeth, a town that itself is steeped in more than 1,000 years of history, as **Ian Leech** reports.

Guarded at its Market Place entrance by the imposing Clock Tower that can trace its history back for more than 400 years, Oldgate has been at the very heart of community life in Morpeth almost from time immemorial.

The Clock Tower is, of course, one of three iconic landmarks in the centre of Morpeth, the others being the 16th Century Chantry, and the Town Hall designed more than 300 years ago by the legendary architect Sir John Vanbrugh of Blenheim Palace, Castle Howard and Delaval Hall fame. The Clock Tower was built between 1604 and 1634 reputedly using re-cycled Medieval stone perhaps from Newminster Abbey.


The 60-feet high structure houses a peal of six bells acquired for Morpeth in 1706 by Major General Edmund Main whilst he was the town's Member of Parliament. The bells are now the oldest civic peal of bells in the country and are still rung at 8pm every evening, a curfew tradition going back some 350 years.

Oldgate's other claim to fame is that it was the home of one of England's greatest seafarers Admiral Lord Collingwood and his family from 1791 until his death in 1810. The Admiral who was born in Newcastle and first went to sea as a 12-year-old boy, rose through the naval ranks to sail alongside Horatio Nelson and indeed took over command of the English fleet after his great friend was fatally wounded during the Battle of Trafalgar in 1805.

Collingwood House where the Admiral loved to spend time during his shore leaves, is now the Presbytery for St Robert's RC Church.

Today, Oldgate remains a corner of Morpeth where a vibrant and diverse range of shops and businesses are to be found, bringing their own unique style of trading to the town centre and is now affectionately being branded 'Oldgate Village.'

Celebrated former journalist, television executive, book and cultural festival director turned author Alistair Moffatt found himself on the other end of the questions when he popped across the border to preview his appearance at next Spring's Morpeth Book Festival, writes lan Leech.

His visit to the town was to record an interview with young students at Morpeth's Collingwood School and Media Arts College, and they have another lined up with local crime writer Marie Hannah who also happens to be the Patron of the Morpeth festival.

I also managed a chat with Alistair, who has enjoyed a stellar career as a writer, broadcaster, festivals' organiser and author. Born in Kelso he still lives in the Borders

After graduating from St Andrews' University with an honour's degree in medieval history, Alistair launched on a career which would see him become the Director of Edinburgh's Fringe Festival, before joining Scottish television where he rose to become programme director and then STV chairman. After his television work he was one of the founders of the Borders Book Festival and the Lennoxlove Book Festival, and would later take on the role of Rector of the University.

Bearing in mind his vast experience of running and attending books festival, I wanted to talk with him about their importance to both authors and readers, as well as quizzing him on how the Morpeth festival can develop into a popular and well attended event.

Alistair is also a prolific author of more than 30 non-fiction books, many of which tell tales from his beloved Borders Country and indeed the history of the whole of Scotland, some of which have been adapted into television series and he will talk about his works when he comes to the 2024 Morpeth Book Festival.

As he told me: "Writing is a solitary business so festivals are a good way for authors to meet their readers and listen to them. Sessions should always include questions and answers and it is also good to meet other writers as well as journalists, agents, booksellers and people who come to the event.

"My advice to the organisers of the Morpeth event is - wherever possible - go for the biggest and most famous names you can and build on that." When he was launching the festivals he was involved with, he did just that and managed to bring together a cast-list of such names as John Cleese, Germaine Greer, Sheila Hancock, Michael Palin and Joanne Lumley to credit a few.

"It is also important to remember that festivals are live and unrepeatable and there will be no other way to experience hearing and meeting the authors. The sessions are like parties and you need to go to them!

"Younger people will also come to a festival event if it is starry enough, so it is always good to mix in show business if you can. But whatever you do, don't call it a literary festival because that will put people off."

Wise words from an experienced writer and broadcaster, who will be one of the 'Big Names' at the Morpeth Book Festival which will run over the weekend of March 23rd and 24th next year. The Festival will once again by organised by Greater Morpeth Development Trust in conjunction with Northumberland Library Service. Tickets will go on sale early next year and the Inside Morpeth February edition will publish the full programme of events.



Post early for Christmas say Morpeth scouts

A local postal service run by youngsters from the 4th Morpeth Scout Group that has become something of a festive tradition in and around the town, is back in time for Christmas.

The service has been running for more than 20 years with the scouts siting 'post boxes' around town so they can collect and then deliver cards to homes around Morpeth.

This year the boxes will be in Central Bean in Sanderson Arcade, the Health Hut on the Kirkhill Estate, Co-op stores at Loansdean and Pegswood, Morrisons and Sainsbury's stores.

The way the service works is that people can 'post' their Christmas cards in the scouts' boxes along with a suggested 40p donation for each card. Then, after the last day for posting on Friday December 15th, its all hands to the deck


to sort the cards into piles for each street in Morpeth plus surrounding villages such as Pegswood, Mitford and Hepscott, so that the delivery teams of around 250 Scouts, Squirrels and Beavers can collect the cards they have been allocated to deliver.

Their pledge is that all cards will be delivered in time for Christmas. The younger Squirrels and Beavers tend to deliver to their own or neighbouring streets; the Cubs have a round of their own; while the older Scouts cover the rest of Morpeth.

As Ellen Glynn, Leader of the Monday (Matobo) Troop, told Inside Morpeth: "Whilst the service is one of our biggest fundraisers, it also serves a number of other functions. It has become a Christmas tradition for our young people and leaders alike, and having a festive delivery round gives them a real sense of responsibility as well as counting towards a badge."



Keeping up a festive scouting tradition



New word that could affect us all - but just what does it mean?

A term you are going to hear more of in the coming months is 'LURB'. So, what is it all about you may ask. LURB is an acronym for the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill. It will, in time, affect most, if not all of you Planning Consultant Tony Carter explains

On Thursday 26th October 2023 the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) announced that the bill had received royal assent and was now law. The new act, which was first published in May 2022, makes several significant changes to the planning system.

Whilst the Bill getting Royal Assent is a big achievement, there is still a lot of work left to do in terms of bringing the provisions in the act into effect, which will require a huge raft of further consultations, detailed technical work, and secondary legislation.

While secondary legislation has not yet been enacted, here are 15 things you need to know about on how the new laws will change the planning system.

- 1. Local planning authorities will be required to have a design code in place covering their entire areas.
- The area-wide codes will act as a framework, for which subsequent detailed design codes can come forward, prepared for specific areas or sites, and led either by the local planning authority, neighbourhood planning groups or by developers as part of planning applications. This will help ensure good design is considered at all levels down to individual plots.
- 2. More weight will be given to local plans, neighbourhood plans and spatial development strategies proposed by mayors or combined authorities. Local plans, neighbourhood plans and spatial development strategies proposed by mayors or combined authorities will be given more weight when decisions are made on applications so that there must be strong reasons to override the plan, providing communities more certainty.
- 3. A simpler alternative to preparing neighbourhood plans will be introduced. A new neighbourhood planning tool called a 'neighbourhood priorities statement' will provide communities with a simpler and more accessible way to set out their key priorities and preferences for their local areas. Local authorities will need to take these into account, where relevant, when preparing their local plans for the areas concerned, enabling more communities to better engage in the local plan-
- propose development on their street and hold a vote on whether planning permission should be given. This will provide a positive incentive for neighbours to consider the potential for development, especially in areas of higher demand, and support a gentle increase in densities through wellconsidered, well-designed, and locally supported proposals.

4. A 'street votes' system will permit residents to

- 5. Decision-makers will face a new duty to act in line with the development plan and national policies. On the planning application process the Bill will impose a new duty on decision-makers to make planning decisions in accordance with the development plan and national development management policies unless material considerations strongly indicate otherwise. This is to increase certainty in planning decisions.
- 6. Loopholes preventing planning enforcement will be closed. The Bill amends and strengthens the powers and sanctions available to local planning authorities to deal with individuals who fail to abide by the rules and process of the planning system. This includes facilitating enforcement action by closing existing loopholes which can be exploited to prolong unauthorised development, allowing more time for the investigation of breaches, introducing enforcement warning notices, making the enforcement timescales that currently apply more consistent, and increasing fines.
- 7. Registered parks and gardens will get the same level of planning protection as listed buildings. The Bill will make changes so that designated heritage assets, such as registered parks and gardens, World Heritage Sites, protected wreck sites, and registered battlefields, enjoy the same statutory protection in the planning system as listed buildings and conservation areas.
- 8. Planning authorities will get the power to instigate auctions to take leases on vacant high street properties. The Bill gives local authorities powers to instigate auctions to rent vacant commercial properties in town centres and on high streets, for leases from one to five years to attract new tenants. These new powers can be exercised at the discretion of local authorities, based on their local context, and need, but only on properties which have been vacant for over 12 months.
- 9. A council tax premium on second homes can be introduced. The Bill introduces a discretionary council tax premium on second homes and changes the qualifying period for use of the long term-empty homes premium. Local authorities may levy a premium of up to an additional 100 per cent on council tax bills for second homes and for empty homes after one year (as opposed to two years which is the current requirement).
- 10. Planning application fees will be raised by more than one-third. The government intends to increase planning fees for major and minor applications by 35 per cent and 25 per cent respectively (subject to consultation). However, MPs refused to accept an amendment proposed in the House of Lords which would have allowed councils to set their own application fees.

11. The emphasis of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) will shift to guiding plan-making.

Policies in the current NPPF that are intended to guide decision-making will be stripped out to form the basis of the promised National Development Management Policies (NDMP) that will take precedence over local plans as the primary policy guide for decision-making.

12. Tools to force developers to complete schemes will be made easier for authorities to use. The Act will make it easier for planning authorities to issue completion notices to developers to require them to complete their projects. It will also introduce commencement notices which will be required when a scheme with planning permission starts on site, which will address perceptions of 'land banking' and slow build-out by larger developers.

13. Benefit to the public purse will become a factor in authorities' land allocation decisions. Planning authorities will be able to partially base their land allocation decisions on the option price of sites offered to them by developers, under legislation promised by the Bill to enable the piloting of "Community Land Auctions". Landowners will be able to submit their land into an allocation process as part of an emerging local plan, offering the local planning authority an option on the land at a price set by the landowner. The local authority will allocate land based on both planning considerations and the option price. It will then auction the development rights onto a successful bidder once land is allocated in the adopted plan. The difference between the option price offered by landowners, and the price offered to develop allocated land, will be retained by local authorities for the benefit of local communities.

14. Powers to require developers to engage with communities at the pre-application stage will be made permanent. For decision-making, the Act will also enable pre-application engagement with communities to be required before a planning application is submitted.

15. Councils will have the power to decline to determine applications from applicants who have been slow to implement previous permissions across their entire authority areas. Authorities will therefore be able to refuse to determine an application for planning permission in certain cases where there was a previous application relating to land within the authority's area and the development was not begun or has been carried out unreasonably slowly.

So, there you have it, a 'B-LURB' on my top 15 takeaways from the Bill. Some will affect you at some point in your everyday life, and some will not, but now you will know what LURB is mostly about.



Could there be another Lioness among Morpeth's football cubs?

Back in the day the dreams of many young girls more likely centred around being a singer in a band, a movie star, a catwalk model or on a sporting front, a gold medalwinning Olympic athlete than a footballer - but not anymore! A growing number of today's generation of young girls have added professional footballer into their dream mix, and a lot of those hopes and ambitions are undoubtedly linked to the outstanding success of the Lionesses from England women's football team.

Over the past three or four years, England players like goalkeeper Mary Earps, defenders Lucy Bronze and Millie Bright, midfielders Jill Scott, Keira Walsh, Georgia Staniforth and forwards Beth Mead, Lauren Hemp and Chloe Kelly to name a few, have become household names and role models inspiring young girls like the members the Under 13 Morpeth Jaguars side, to want to take up the game. Northumberland's Lucy Bronze currently plays for Barcelona, while the now-retired Jill Scott has fashioned a new career as a television celebrity after last year being crowned ITV's 'I'm a Celebrity' Queen of the Jungle!

The Lionesses won the 2022 Euro tournament by beating Germany two goals to one in the final match at a packed Wembley Stadium plus millions watching on television, while more recently they finished runners-up to Spain in the World Cup final in Australia and those achievements have fuelled a massive surge of interest in the game among senior and junior players.

The Morpeth Jaguars team of young girls was formed five years ago and now plays home games in its Northumberland FA age-group league, at Morpeth's Chantry School. Once a week the 19 members of the squad also train on Morpeth Town FC's 3G pitch at Craik Park.

Inside Morpeth Editor Ian Leech was invited along to one such training session to learn more about the team and to see the girls presented with their new strips

by their sponsor Sarah Hickson who runs her own Northern Skin Co skincare and beauty treatment business from Hadston after being based in Morpeth for 17 years. "As a business we wanted to give something back to the community of Morpeth which has supported us for so many years, and as we all love football as a family we decided together to sponsor the new strips for the girls," said Sarah.

Mark Alexander has been coaching the team almost since the Jaguars were founded by Magda Carr who still helps out with coaching as well as playing for the Alnwick Ladies' team. It takes a real team effort to put all the pieces together to create the best possible environment for the girls and we like to think we are the very essence of grassroots football."

At the time of writing Jaguars were placed mid-table in their league and looking forward to a 'derby' game with the Morpeth Tigers team.

"There's no doubt there has been a massive upsurge of interest in women's football at all age levels because of the Lionesses," Mark added. "We now have 19 girls in the squad and have to rotate playing time so that we have 13 or 14 players available to pick from on match days so that everyone gets a fair share of playing time."

And the girls clearly love playing for football at the club as I witnessed on a pouring wet night when they did not cut short their training session by one minute. Perhaps that's the dedication and commitment that one day could see one of them become a Lioness!

Some ghosts from Christmases past

"What's for Christmas dinner. Mam?" That's what our mothers must have heard us say, many a time in years gone by, writes our columnist Bridget Gubbins

When I was a little girl in the 1950s, we had a chicken. That was a big enough treat in those days when everyone was hard up after the war. Later as times became easier, we upgraded to a turkey. In my husband's family in Chicago, a big juicy piece of ham was traditional Christmas dinner.

The most amazing Christmas dinner I ever had was in far-away Hungary in 1966. I had just been welcomed into the home of a kindly country family. My diary tells the story:

And then a few days later:

"I am drowsing in my cosy feather bed at 8am when I hear the unusual sound of many chattering voices in the kitchen. Who can be there so early? I learn that the pig is now in porcine heaven. All the action took place while I was contentedly asleep.

"I was amazed at the variety of things they made from one pig - sausages and salted hams, and a year's supply of lard. The smell of blood and the smoky melting fat was not appealing to me, the vegetarian. At midday, there was a huge meal, everyone very merry, drinking and eating enormous helpings of freshly killed and cooked meat. I found it barbaric, somewhat fascinating, to see such meathungry people.

"In the evening, kind Mutti laid out a candlelit spread. There were ball-shaped biscuits soaked in hot water and mixed up with sugar and ground poppy seeds; a chocolate and walnut cake more cream than cake; a huge golden homemade sweet loaf. What with home-made wine, we almost burst by the time we had finished."

These were country people in the deep dark days of Communism. Yet it must have been similar in Morpeth

and the surrounding areas in those years. All our grannies and grandfathers will have stories about Christmas food, often produced from the local farms where perhaps killing the pig was still an annual ritual. And as for meat-free treats, does anyone remember the heavenly-smelling Christmas pudding steaming on the coal-fired stove?


Rick's super supper ideas!

In 1881 Richard Hollon, Lord Mayor of York, gave the Morpeth Corporation what at the time was the princely sum of £5,000 to give 25 people from the town what he described as a 'liberal meat tea' a ton of coal and £10 a quarter, in memory of his late wife Mary who had been brought up in Morpeth by her uncle Dr William Trotter.

That tradition continues today – minus the ton of coal

- thanks to the Mary Hollon Annuity & Relief in Need Fund. Tea was provided by Newgate Street's Café des Amis, with entertainment from singer Lou Coel. The annuitants as those invited to the tea are called, have to be over the age of 75 and have lived in Morpeth for at least 10 years. Morpeth Mayor Councillor Jade Crawford was a special guest at the Hollon Tea in the Town Hall.





'It's time to have a good clean up.' Jacky's traditions

As a boy of six or seven, I spent most weekends standing in the 'hut' belonging to my grandfather (affectionately known as 'Jacky'), peering on tiptoes at the old-fashioned tools and gardening projects spread across his well-worn work bench.

Gardening wasn't just a pastime to Jacky, it was a way of life and things had to be done the proper way. Time spent in the presence of such a keen amateur, who gardened using traditional methods, was an education: everything in straight lines, neat rows, regimented borders of perfectly grown, gaudy annuals.

Everything had its place, everything had its purpose, everything had its particular way of being grown and nurtured. No matter what the time of year, the garden had to be tidy and his tools kept sharp and in their right place.

Today, stepping into the same hut, which now has pride of place in my own garden, I am transported back to those days. The heady smell of oil, paraffin heaters and earth remain, as do many of the lessons I learned from Jacky. With his words of wisdom echoing in my mind, it's time to have a good clean up around the garden.

Fruit pruning

Winter is the perfect time to prune a plethora of fruiting trees and shrubs, including autumn-fruiting raspberries, gooseberries, blackcurrants, redcurrants, greenhouse grown grapevines and pear and apple trees.

Each one requires its own degree of pruning, but as a rule of thumb, remove any dead, crossing or crowded growth from fruit trees and shrubs and cut all canes to the ground on autumn-fruiting raspberries.

Grapevines only fruit on new growth so remove all side shoots back to two buds - don't be afraid to snip away at grapevines as they respond well to pruning.

Hellebore haircut

To keep hellebores looking their best, cut back all the leaves to ground level, leaving only the flowing spikes in place.

This will not only showcase the flowers better but also encourage new, lush growth to take their place for a healthier looking plant.

Homemade crumbles

January is the time to start forcing rhubarb plants into a flush of early, delicious growth. Turn a large pot upside down over the top of the rhubarb crown, making sure to cover up any holes in the pot to cut out all the light.

Keep checking the stems and start cropping when the stems either reach the top of the pot or are around 30 cm tall.

Tidy up time

Keeping the general garden tidy at this time of year is time well spent. Clear out sheds of old seeds and the inevitable pile of accumulated junk, clear pathways of slippery leaves and repair any broken pathways before expanding ice can cause more damage.

Wrap outdoor taps and isolate the water supply to prevent burst pipes and keep an eye on ponds and frozen birdbaths. The simplest and most effective maintenance task is to sharpen all tools, from spades and shears to secateurs and knives.

There are many methods to do this but a few minutes spent removing sap and rust with a scouring pad followed up by passing a whetstone over blades and finishing with a generous layer of oil will make gardening so much easier in the months ahead.


