Mari is a multi-award-winning, bestselling author/screenwriter who writes across three crime series: DCI Kate Daniels (in development for TV with Sprout Pictures & Atlantic Nomad); Stone & Oliver (under option for TV with Buccaneer Media) and Ryan & O'Neil. Among her numerous awards is a Crime Writers' Association Dagger in the Library 2017. In 2020, she was the recipient of Capital Crime's Crime Book of the Year. She lives in rural Northumberland with her partner, an ex-murder detective.

Dr Gervase Phinn – author, poet, broadcaster, lecturer, educational guru, after-dinner speaker and 'born raconteur' (the Guardian) is perhaps best known for his best-selling series of Dales

books for Penguin and his novels with Hodder. Affectionately dubbed 'the lames Herriot of Schools', his warm-hearted reminiscences about his life as a school inspector in the Yorkshire Dales, have featured heavily on Radio 4 Book of the Week and Book at Bedtime slots. He has written a wide range of academic books, children's poetry and fiction and in 2004 was voted 'Speaker of the Year'.



Alexis also presents the Unsung podcast, featuring full-production audio documentaries and exclusive interviews that shine a rare spotlight on the integral men and women in sport's shadows. He lives in Morpeth with his wife and their two daughters.




Alistair Moffat: A History of the Highlands Sunday 23 March, 13.00-14.00, St George's United Reformed Church, £10

Alistair Moffat tells the extraordinary story of the Highlands in the most detailed book ever written about this remarkable part of Scotland.

This is the story of the Highlands and Islands of Scotland as it has never been told before. From the formation of the landscape millions of years ago to the twenty-first century, it brings to life the events and the people who have shaped Highland history, from saints, sinners and outlaws to monarchs, clan chiefs and warriors.

Highly readable and informative, it mines a wide range of sources including medieval manuscripts and sagas, poetry and popular culture. Picts, Romans, Irish missionaries, Vikings, Jacobites and the flood of emigrants who left to forge new lives abroad are just some of the important players in the drama. As he paints the bigger picture, Alistair Moffat also introduces many key aspects of Highland culture and explores the experience of ordinary Highlanders and Islanders over thousands of years.

An epic seven book series on the history of Morpeth

Over 2011 to 2018, with Greater Morpeth Development Trust and some of the books funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, Bridget has written seven books covering different aspects of Morpeth's illustrious, if at times, somewhat murky past.

Morpeth has had its full share of medieval history - a Royal market

charter, the kings' wars, child birth at the castle, a hated king, the illegal hunting and killing of deer in the king's forest, a wicked sheriff and a child marriage...it is all there.

Together, her books will stand the test of time as enduring social records of life in the town perhaps not widely known or written about in the way Bridget has done.

Lesley Mountain is a gardener, climate emergency worrier and poet. She has three pamphlet collections: *Hunting the Air* (Vane Women);

Ellen Phethean's work has been broadcast on BBC Radio and performed widely. The poetry includes: Wall, Portrait of the Quince as an Older Woman; Shedding the Niceties and A Young Adult Trilogy, Ren and the Blue Hands.
